

Darwin Experts Volunteer to Design Life-Changing Disability Centre in Timor-Leste

A group of Northern Territory professionals are in Timor-Leste to help expand a vital disability care centre — offering new hope to some of the country’s most vulnerable children.

From 3–6 November, a volunteer team of Darwin-based engineers, architects and planners will travel to Dili to prepare a pro bono Master Plan for a major expansion of the Alma Sisters Community Centre, which provides therapy, education and residential care for children with disabilities who would otherwise have nowhere to go.

Located just 700 kilometres from Darwin, the centre currently supports 17 children full-time and a further 30 children who visit for therapy and learning programs. Many have been orphaned or abandoned due to disability-related stigma, which remains deeply entrenched in parts of Timor-Leste.

The planned \$500,000 redevelopment will double the residential capacity and significantly expand treatment and learning facilities.

“These are busy professionals giving up their own time because they know it will make a real difference,” said Project Coordinator Jocelyn Cull. “Once the Master Plan is complete, it will help secure government, business and philanthropic funding to see this project built.”

Expansion Plans

The redevelopment will include:

- 10 therapy and education rooms
- 4 new residential rooms (increasing capacity to 30 children)
- 2 new bathroom and toilet blocks

A Mission Close to the Heart

Bishop Charles Gauci, Catholic Diocese of Darwin, said he strongly supports the initiative:

“I have personally witnessed the Sisters’ ministry and was profoundly moved by their Christ-like love for the children in their care. Their dedication is remarkable, and I hold the deepest respect for them. This project deserves our full support.”

In 2024, Pope Francis visited the centre, praising the Alma Sisters’ mission to protect and uplift children with disabilities.

Timeline

- November 2025: Master Plan completed
- Early 2026: Funding applications
- Mid-2026–2027: Construction (pending funding)
- First stage completed: 18–24 months after construction begins
